Reyner Banham Nigel Whiteley, 2003-08-29 An intellectual biography of the cultural critic Reyner Banham Reyner Banham 1922 88 was one of the most influential writers on architecture design and popular culture from the mid 1950s to the late 1980s Trained in mechanical engineering and art history he was convinced that technology was making society not only more exciting but more democratic His combination of academic rigor and pop culture sensibility put him in opposition to both traditionalists and orthodox Modernists but placed him in a unique position to understand the cultural social and political implications of the visual arts in the postwar period His first book *Theory and Design in the First Machine Age* still in print with The MIT Press after forty years was central to the overhaul of Modernism and it gave Futurism and Expressionism credibility amid the dynamism and change of the 1960s This intellectual biography is the first comprehensive critical examination of Banham s theories and ideas not only on architecture but also on the wide variety of subjects that interested him It covers the full range of his oeuvre and discusses the values enthusiasms and influences that formed his thinking

Architecture and the Image at the Turn of the 21st Century Sanja Rodeš, 2024-06-28. This book examines architecture, image and media relationships as productive for architecture and architectural discourses. By arguing that the relationships between architecture and media cannot be dismissed via linear criticism of architecture and media, or image, these relations are instead seen as a part of a sphere, a mediasphere of complex relationships. In lieu of anything like a consensus on the contemporary condition of architecture, referring to the late twentieth and the twenty-first centuries, the starting point of this book is that the relationships between architecture, media and images continue to multiply owing to continuous technological advancements. Contemporary architecture considered in this book is related to the selected circumstances of high visibility, where architectural images are propelled into visibility and conflated with non-architectural images. This takes architecture outside of architectural-only discourse and into the public realm. By granting higher visibility to both the architectural images and architecture in the public realm, architecture can also be influenced by the various perceptions of the general public and can enter public consciousness via non-architectural media. With increased visibility, architecture's far-reaching presence calls for more structured analysis of its nature and potential. As the analysed architecture in this book is associated with the discourses outside of architecture, some of which relate to terrorism, natural disaster and branding and consumption, the limits of contemporary architectural discipline are questioned and extended. This book is written for academics and students in architectural history, theory and criticism, particularly those interested in visual and media studies.

Architecture, Media, Archives Ana Bonet Miró, 2024-08-22 Over 60 years on from its inception the celebrated Fun Palace civic project developed in the 1960s by the radical theatre director Joan Littlewood and the architect Cedric Price continues to capture the architectural imagination Despite the building itself never

being realized much of the previous analysis of the Fun Palace has been devoted to Price and his drawings. The critical role that Littlewood played however remains largely unrecognized by architectural scholarship and a whole area of the project's cultural agenda remains overlooked. *Architecture Media Archives* is the first serious study of the complex relations between Littlewood and Price reframing the Fun Palace as an extended media project and positioning Littlewood more clearly as co-designer. Drawing on extensive archival material, the book considers how due to a lack of institutional support the aims of the Fun Palace to transform the passive mass audiences of post-war consumer society into active citizens through forms of self-directed pleasure led and open exchange were realized through different sites of information throughout the 1960s. From broadsheets, pamphlets and journals to films and press news, the book addresses the conditions of production, circulation, storage and reception of these sites and reveals how they not only recorded the transformation of the project but also fundamentally enhanced and informed its meaning in specific ways. The book also raises important questions about the agency of the Fun Palace archive in shaping the reception of the project in the decades since its inception, presenting its analysis through a novel Fun Palace Reception Index and Chart, fundamentally altering our view of the project itself and transforming the way in which we understand the technological and cultural production of the 1960s.

Constructing Building Enclosures Clifton Fordham, 2020-07-21 *Constructing Building Enclosures* investigates and interrogates tensions that arose between the disciplines of architecture and engineering as they wrestled with technology and building cultures that evolved to deliver structures in the modern era.
