Banks, William Crow Webb, Asa Maxson Fitz Randolph, Gasper Christopher Clemens, Thomas Emmet Dewey, Llewellyn James Graham, Oscar Leopold Moore, Earl Hilton Hatcher, Howard Franklin McCue, 1886      *The Political Orchestra* Fritz Trümpi, 2024-05-31 This is a groundbreaking study of the prestigious Berlin and Vienna Philharmonics during the Third Reich Making extensive use of archival material including some discussed here for the first time Fritz Trümpi offers new insight into the orchestras place in the larger political constellation Trümpi looks first at the decades preceding National Socialist rule when the competing orchestras whose rivalry mirrored a larger rivalry between Berlin and Vienna were called on to represent superior Austro German music and were integrated into the administrative and social structures of their respective cities becoming vulnerable to political manipulation in the process He then turns to the Nazi period when the orchestras came to play a major role in cultural policies As he shows the philharmonics in their own unique ways strengthened National Socialist dominance through their showcasing of Germanic culture in the mass media performances for troops and the general public and fictional representations in literature and film Accompanying these propaganda efforts was an increasing politicization of the orchestras which ranged from the dismissal of Jewish members to the programming of ideologically appropriate repertory all in the name of racial and cultural purity Richly documented and refreshingly nuanced *The Political Orchestra* is a bold exploration of the ties between music and politics under fascism      *The Journal of the Kansas Bar Association* Kansas Bar Association, 2001      **Kansas History**, 2018

**The Harriman Alaska Expedition of 1899** John J. Michalik, 2021-08-11 In 1899 one of America's wealthiest men assembled an interdisciplinary team of experts many of whom would become legendary in their fields to join him entirely at his expense on a voyage to the largely unknown territory of Alaska The Harriman Expedition remains unparalleled in its conception and execution This book follows the team closely where they went what they did and what they learned including finding early evidence of glacial retreat assessing the nature and future of Alaska's natural resources making important scientific discoveries and collecting an astonishing collection of specimens A second thread involves the lives and accomplishments of the members of the party weaving biographical strands into the narrative of the journey and the personal experiences they shared This is the first comprehensive scholarly treatment of the Harriman Alaska Expedition since the 1980s It features the diaries letters home and post Expedition writings including unpublished autobiographies generated by the members of the party      *Redeeming the South* Paul Harvey, 2000-11-09 Together and separately black and white Baptists created different but intertwined cultures that profoundly shaped the South Adopting a biracial and bicultural focus Paul Harvey works to redefine southern religious history and by extension southern culture as the product of such interaction the result of whites and blacks having drawn from and influenced each other even while remaining separate and distinct Harvey explores the parallels and divergences of black and white religious institutions as manifested through differences in

worship styles sacred music and political agendas He examines the relationship of broad social phenomena like progressivism and modernization to the development of southern religion focusing on the clash between rural southern folk religious expression and models of spirituality drawn from northern Victorian standards In tracing the growth of Baptist churches from small outposts of radically democratic plain folk religion in the mid eighteenth century to conservative and culturally dominant institutions in the twentieth century Harvey explores one of the most impressive evolutions of American religious and cultural history

*Music and the Making of Modern Japan* Margaret Mehl, 2024-05-29 Japan was the first non Western nation to compete with the Western powers at their own game The country's rise to a major player on the stage of Western music has been equally spectacular The connection between these two developments however has never been explored How did making music make Japan modern How did Japan make music that originated in Europe its own And what happened to Japan's traditional music in the process Music and the Making of Modern Japan answers these questions Discussing musical modernization in the context of globalization and nation building Margaret Mehl argues that far from being a side show music was part of the action on centre stage Making music became an important vehicle for empowering the people of Japan to join in the shaping of the modern world In only fifty years from the 1870s to the early 1920s Japanese people laid the foundations for the country's post war rise as a musical as well as an economic power Meanwhile new types of popular song fuelled by the growing global record industry successfully blended inspiration from the West with musical characteristics perceived as Japanese Music and the Making of Modern Japan represents a fresh contribution to historical research on making music as a major cultural social and political force

**John Quincy Adams and the Gag Rule, 1835-1850** Peter Charles Hoffer, 2017-11-01 Examining the congressional debates on antislavery petitions before the Civil War Passed by the House of Representatives at the start of the 1836 session the gag rule rejected all petitions against slavery effectively forbidding Congress from addressing the antislavery issue until it was rescinded in late 1844 In the Senate a similar rule lasted until 1850 Strongly supported by all southern and some northern Democratic congressmen the gag rule became a proxy defense of slavery's morality and economic value in the face of growing pro abolition sentiment In *John Quincy Adams and the Gag Rule 1835-1850* Peter Charles Hoffer transports readers to Washington DC in the period before the Civil War to contextualize the heated debates surrounding the rule At first Hoffer explains only a few members of Congress objected to the rule These antislavery representatives argued strongly for the reception and reading of incoming abolitionist petitions When they encountered an almost uniformly hostile audience however John Quincy Adams took a different tack He saw the effort to gag the petitioners as a violation of their constitutional rights Adams's campaign to lift the gag rule joined each year by more and more northern members of Congress revealed how the slavery issue promoted a virulent sectionalism and ultimately played a part in southern secession and the Civil War A lively narrative intended for history classrooms and anyone interested in abolitionism slavery Congress and the coming of the Civil War John Quincy

Adams and the Gag Rule 1835 1850 vividly portrays the importance of the political machinations and debates that colored the age

**Designs on Empire** Andrew Priest,2021-08-31 In the eyes of both contemporaries and historians the United States became an empire in 1898 By taking possession of Cuba and the Philippines the nation seemed to have reached a watershed moment in its rise to power spurring arguments over whether it should be a colonial power at all However the questions that emerged in the wake of 1898 built on long standing and far reaching debates over America s place in the world Andrew Priest offers a new understanding of the roots of American empire that foregrounds the longer history of perceptions of European powers He traces the development of American thinking about European imperialism in the years after the Civil War before the United States embarked on its own overseas colonial projects Designs on Empire examines responses to Napoleon III s intervention in Mexico Spain and the Ten Years War in Cuba Britain s occupation of Egypt and the carving up of Africa at the Berlin Conference Priest shows how observing and interacting with other empires shaped American understandings of the international environment and their own burgeoning power He highlights ambivalence among American elites regarding empire as well as the prevalence of notions of racial hierarchy While many deplored the way powerful nations dominated others others saw imperial projects as the advance of civilization and even critics often felt a closer affinity with European imperialists than colonized peoples A wide ranging book that blends intellectual political and diplomatic history Designs on Empire sheds new light on the foundations of American power

*Science, Religion, and the Protestant Tradition* James C. Ungureanu,2019-10-03 The story of the conflict thesis between science and religion the notion of perennial conflict or warfare between the two is part of our modern self understanding As the story goes John William Draper 1811 1882 and Andrew Dickson White 1832 1918 constructed dramatic narratives in the nineteenth century that cast religion as the relentless enemy of scientific progress And yet despite its resilience in popular culture historians today have largely debunked the conflict thesis Unravelling its origins James Ungureanu argues that Draper and White actually hoped their narratives would preserve religious belief For them science was ultimately a scapegoat for a much larger and more important argument dating back to the Protestant Reformation where one theological tradition was pitted against another a more progressive liberal and diffusive Christianity against a more traditional conservative and orthodox Christianity By the mid nineteenth century narratives of conflict between science and religion were largely deployed between contending theological schools of thought However these narratives were later appropriated by secularists freethinkers and atheists as weapons against all religion By revisiting its origins development and popularization Ungureanu ultimately reveals that the conflict thesis was just one of the many unintended consequences of the Protestant Reformation

Proceedings in Parliament, 1614 (House of Commons) England and Wales. Parliament. House of Commons,Maija Jansson,1988 An edition of the extant manuscripts of proceedings in the Lower House of the English parliament of 1614 prefaced by a critical introduction to the texts and a description of source materials The vol includes 8 appendixes one of which is a list of returns

that reveals the full membership of the House of Commons in 1614 Until recently historians believed that apart from the official Journal of the House of Commons no complete account of the 1614 assembly survived Immediately after the close of the session 4 members were imprisoned in the Tower for remarks made about the crown and the Privy Council ordered the papers and notes of others burned To protect the identity of the author any private diary of the session retained as a personal record had to have been well hidden The discovery in the Midlands of an anonymous diary subsequently purchased by the Kenneth Spencer Research Library at the U of Kansas altered this picture and makes possible for the first time close to 400 years after the event a detailed study of the proceedings in that assembly Besides the Kansas diary one other small account of debates that year from a manuscript in Trinity College Cambridge and several folios of proceedings from Petyt MS 538 11 in the Inner Temple Library as well as an unpublished Crown Office list of returns are included in the vol The manuscript Commons Journal and MS Add 48 101 have been re edited with the accounts mentioned above making accessible in one place all of the known accounts of the session Illus

**Passionate Publishers** Phoebe Kornfeld, 2021-08-12 *Passionate Publishers* traces the lives of the German Jewish refugee migr founders of the Black Star photo agency Ernest Mayer Kurt Safranski and Kurt Kornfeld whose expertise helped ignite a revolution in photojournalism The first half of the book lays the groundwork for understanding how Black Star s founders could play such a key role in photojournalism The author reconstructs their history in Germany before and during World War I and details their accomplishments in Berlin s dynamic Weimar era publishing industry The journey into exile of Safranski Mayer and Kornfeld their influence on the editors of *Life* the first decade of Black Star and the most notable post World War II experiences of the photo agency s founders are the focus of the second half of the book Family and governmental archives provide extensive new information about the three men and reveal harrowing investigations by J Edgar Hoover s FBI which believed Black Star s founders to be spies or agents of a foreign government The author argues that the refugee migr s successfully contested the never substantiated allegations on account of their strong views relating to the freedom of the press and the malevolence of discrimination on the basis of race religion or national origin

**Resources in Education** ,1977 *The Farm Press, Reform and Rural Change, 1895-1920* John J. Fry, 2005-04-27 This project contributes to our understanding of rural Midwesterners and farm newspapers at the turn of the century While cultural historians have mainly focused on readers in town and cities it examines Midwestern farmers It also contributes to the new rural history by exploring the ideas of Hal Barron and others that country people selectively adapted the advice given to them by reformers Finally it furthers our understanding of American farm newspapers themselves and offers suggestions on how to use them as sources

*Picturing Indian Territory* B. Byron Price, 2016-10-10 Throughout the nineteenth century the land known as Indian Territory was populated by diverse cultures troubled by shifting political boundaries and transformed by historical events that were colorful dramatic and often tragic Beyond its borders most Americans visualized the area through the pictures produced by non Native travelers artists and reporters all with

differing degrees of accuracy vision and skill The images in *Picturing Indian Territory* and the eponymous exhibit it accompanies conjure a wildly varied vision of Indian Territory's past Spanning nearly nine decades these artworks range from the scientific illustrations found in English naturalist Thomas Nuttall's journal to the paintings of Frederic Remington Henry Farny and Charles Schreyvogel The volume's three essays situate these works within the historical narratives of westward expansion the creation of an Indian Territory separate from the rest of the United States and Oklahoma's eventual statehood in 1907 James Peck focuses on artists who produced images of Native Americans living in this vast region during the pre Civil War era In his essay B Byron Price picks up the story at the advent of the Civil War and examines newspaper and magazine reports as well as the accounts of government functionaries and artist travelers drawn to the region by the rapidly changing fortunes of the area's traditional Indian cultures in the wake of non Indian settlement Mark Andrew White then looks at the art and illustration resulting from the unrelenting efforts of outsiders who settled Indian and Oklahoma Territories in the decades before statehood Some of the artworks featured in this volume have never before been displayed some were produced by more than one artist others are anonymous Many were completed by illustrators on site as the events they depicted unfolded while other artists relied on written accounts and vivid imaginations Whatever their origin these depictions of the people places and events of Indian Country defined the region for contemporary American and European audiences Today they provide a rich visual record of a key era of western and Oklahoma history and of the ways that art has defined this important cultural crossroads

*The Border Between Them* Jeremy Neely, 2007 The most bitter guerrilla conflict in American history raged along the Kansas Missouri border from 1856 to 1865 making that frontier the first battleground in the struggle over slavery That fiercely contested boundary represented the most explosive political fault line in the United States and its bitter divisions foreshadowed an entire nation torn asunder Jeremy Neely now examines the significance of the border war on both sides of the Kansas Missouri line and offers a comparative cross border analysis of its origins meanings and consequences A narrative history of the border war and its impact on citizens of both states *The Border between Them* recounts the exploits of John Brown William Quantrill and other notorious guerrillas but it also uncovers the stories of everyday people who lived through that conflict Examining the frontier period to the close of the nineteenth century Neely frames the guerrilla conflict within the larger story of the developing West and squares that violent period with the more peaceful though never tranquil periods that preceded and followed it Focusing on the countryside south of the big bend in the Missouri River an area where there was no natural boundary separating the states Neely examines three border counties in each state that together illustrate both sectional division and national reunion He draws on the letters and diaries of ordinary citizens as well as newspaper accounts election results and census data to illuminate the complex strands that helped bind Kansas and Missouri together in post Civil War America He shows how people on both sides of the line were already linked by common racial attitudes farming practices and ambivalence toward railroad expansion he then tells how

emancipation industrialization and immigration eventually eroded wartime divisions and facilitated the reconciliation of old foes from each state Today the border war survives in the form of interstate rivalries between collegiate Tigers and Jayhawks allowing Neely to consider the limits of that reconciliation and the enduring power of identities forged in wartime The Border between Them is a compelling account of the terrible first act of the American Civil War and its enduring legacy for the conflict s veterans victims and survivors as well as subsequent generations

*Nanking* Masahiro Yamamoto,2000-08-30 The December 1937 incident that has come to be known as the Rape of Nanking is without doubt a tragedy that will not soon be forgotten While acknowledging that a tremendous loss of life occurred this study challenges the current prevailing notion that the incident was a deliberate planned effort on the part of the Japanese military and analyzes events to produce an accurate estimate of the scale of the atrocities Drawing on Chinese Japanese and English sources Yamamoto determines that what happened at Nanking were unfortunate atrocities of conventional war with precedents in both Eastern and Western military history He concludes that post war events such as the war crimes trials and the impact of the Holocaust in Europe affected public opinion regarding Nanking and led to a dramatic reinterpretation of events The Rape of Nanking consisted of two distinct phases the mass execution of prisoners of war as well as conscription age men who appeared to be combatants and the delinquent acts of individual soldiers The first phase which occurred immediately after Nanking s fall and which claimed most of the atrocity victims was the result of the Japanese military s attempt to clear the city of Chinese soldiers thought to be in plain clothes The second phase which lasted approximately six weeks was horrible but resulted in a much smaller number of fatalities It was characterized by numerous criminal acts ranging from rape and murder to arson and theft committed by unrestrained Japanese soldiers The root cause for both phases was the Japanese military s bureaucratic inefficiency and command irresponsibility While both Chinese and American contemporary sources initially attributed the incident to these causes subsequent Japanese atrocities against both military and civilian Allied personnel during World War II and evidence presented at war crimes trials would come to reshape perceptions of the Nanking events as an Asian counterpart to the Nazi Holocaust

**The Diaries of Reuben Smith, Kansas Settler and Civil War Soldier** Lana Wirt Myers,2018-03-21 In 1854 after recently arriving from England twenty two year old Reuben Smith traveled west eventually making his way to Kansas Territory There he found himself in the midst of a bloody prelude to the Civil War as Free Staters and defenders of slavery battled to stake their claim The young Englishman wrote down what he witnessed in a diary where he had already begun documenting his days in a clear and candid fashion As beautifully written as they are keenly observant these diaries afford an unusual view of America in its most tumultuous times of Kansas in its critical historical moments and of one man s life in the middle of it all for fifty years From his moving account of traveling from England by ship to his reflections on settling in the newly opened Kansas Territory to his observations of war and politics Smith provides a picture that is at once panoramic and highly personal His diaries depict the escalation of the Civil War along the Kansas Missouri



border as well as the evolution of a volunteer soldier from an inexperienced private to a seasoned officer and government spy. They take us inside military camps and generals' quarters to the front lines of battle and in pursuit of bushwhackers William Quantrill and Cole Younger. Later they show us Smith as a state representative and steward of the Kansas State Insane Asylum in its early years. In historic scenes and poignant personal stories, these diaries offer a unique perspective on life in the Midwest in the last half of the nineteenth century. Editor Lana Wirt Myers's commentary and extensive notes provide the context and information needed for a full understanding of Reuben Smith's remarkable stories.

**Handbook of Research Methods in Cardiovascular Behavioral Medicine** Neil Schneiderman, Stephen M. Weiss, Peter G. Kaufmann, 2013-11-21

Cardiovascular disease continues to be the number one cause of death in the United States. Behavioral medicine was developed and shaped into the one source of morbidity and mortality in our country following the definition of the World Health Organization. Despite a 35% reduction in mortality since 1964, cardiovascular disease remains the leading cause of death in the United States. Behavioral medicine is the interdisciplinary field concerned with the development and integration of behavioral and biomedical science knowledge and techniques to the prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and rehabilitation of cardiovascular disease. The Framingham study, among others, has identified the application of this knowledge and these techniques to prevention, diagnosis, treatment, and rehabilitation. Three major risk factors implicated in the development of CHD are smoking, elevated serum cholesterol, and high blood pressure. This concept of biobehavioral collaboration is challenged by scientists and clinicians of many disciplines to consider how they might more effectively develop diagnostic, treatment, and prevention strategies. It has become obvious that additional diagnostic, treatment, and prevention strategies must be identified if further progress is to be made in disease prevention and simultaneously among other behavioral psychology control.
