**Gendering the Crown in the Spanish Baroque Comedia** María Cristina Quintero, 2016-04-15 The Baroque Spanish stage is populated with virile queens and feminized kings This study examines the diverse ways in which seventeenth century comedias engage with the discourse of power and rulership and how it relates to gender A privileged place for ideological negotiation the comedia provided negative and positive reflections of kingship at a time when there was a perceived crisis of monarchical authority in the Habsburg court Author María Cristina Quintero explores how playwrights such as Pedro Calderón de la Barca Tirso de Molina Antonio Coello and Francisco Bances Candamo taking inspiration from legend myth and history repeatedly staged fantasies of feminine rule at a time when there was a concerted effort to contain women's visibility and agency in the public sphere The comedia's preoccupation with kingship together with its obsession with the representation of women and women's bodies renders the question of royal subjectivity inseparable from issues surrounding masculinity and femininity Taking into account theories of performance and performativity within a historical context this study investigates how the themes imagery and language in plays by Calderón and his contemporaries reveal a richly paradoxical presentation of gendered monarchical power

of Europe's first modern centralized empire codes of masculine conduct changed to meet the demands of global rule Viewed chronologically Shifra Armon shows Spanish conduct literature to reveal three axes of transformation The ideal subject gendered male in both practice and law became progressively more adaptable to changing circumstances more intensely involved in currying his own public image and more desirous of achieving renown By bringing recent advances in gender theory to bear on normative rather than non normative masculinities of early modern Spain Armon is able to foreground the emergence of energizing new models of masculine virtue that continue to resonate today

Pan negro Bernardo Atxaga's *El hijo del acordeonista* and Jos María Merino's *La sima* The interrelationship between Republican subalternity and space is redefined by these writers as tense and constantly in flux undermined by its inexorable relationality which leads to subjects endeavoring to instill into space their own values Subjects erode the hegemonic power of the public space by articulating in an often surreptitious form their sense of belonging to a prohibited Republican memory culture In the democratic period they seek a categorical reinstatement of same on the public terrain Ryan also considers the motivation underlying this coterie of authors commitment to the issue of historical memory an analysis which serves to amplify the ambits of existing scholarship that tends to ascribe it solely to postmemory

**Masculinity and Queer Desire in Spanish Enlightenment Literature** Mehl Allan Penrose, 2016-05-06 In *Masculinity and Queer Desire in Spanish Enlightenment Literature* Mehl Allan Penrose examines three distinct male figures each of which was represented as the Other in eighteenth and early nineteenth century Spanish literature The most common configuration of non normative men was the petimetre an effeminate Francophile male who figured a failed masculinity a dubious sexuality and an invasive French cultural presence Also inscribed within cultural discourse were the bujarrón or sodomite who participates in sexual relations with men and the Arcadian shepherd who expresses his desire for other males and who takes on agency as the voice of homoerotica Analyzing journalistic essays poetry and drama Penrose shows that Spanish authors employed queer images of men to engage debates about how males should appear speak and behave and whom they should love in order to be considered real Spaniards Penrose interrogates works by a wide range of writers including Luis Cañuelo Ramón de la Cruz and Félix María de Samaniego arguing that the tropes created by these authors solidified the gender and sexual binary and defined and described what a queer man was in the Spanish collective imaginary *Masculinity and Queer Desire* engages with current cultural historical and theoretical scholarship to propose the notion that the idea of queerness in gender and sexuality based on identifiable criteria started in Spain long before the medical concept of the homosexual was created around 1870

Argentine Serialised Radio Drama in the Infamous Decade, 1930-1943 Lauren Rea, 2016-04-15 In her study of key radio dramas broadcast from 1930 to 1943 Lauren Rea analyses the work of leading exponents of the genre against the wider backdrop of nation building intellectual movements and popular culture in Argentina During the period that has come to be known as the infamous decade radio serials drew on the Argentine literary canon with writers such as Hector Pedro Blomberg and José Andrés González Pulido contributing to the nation building project as they reinterpreted nineteenth century Argentina and repackaged it for a 1930s mass audience Thus a historical romance set in the tumultuous dictatorship of Juan Manuel de Rosas reveals the conflict between the message transmitted to a mass audience through popular radio drama and the work of historical revisionist intellectuals writing in the 1930s Transmitted at the same time González Pulido's gauchesque series evokes powerful notions of Argentine national identity as it explores the relationship of the gaucho with Argentina's immigrant population and advocates for the ideal contribution of women and the immigrant population to Argentine nationhood Rea grounds her study in archival work undertaken at the library of Argentores in Buenos Aires which holds the only surviving collection of scripts of radio serials from the period Rea's book recovers the contribution that these products of popular culture made to the nation building project as they helped to shape and promote the understanding of Argentine history and cultural identity that is widely held today

**Memories of Colonisation in Medieval and Modern Castile** Rebecca De Souza, 2024-10-31 Memories of Colonisation in Medieval and Modern Castile Rereading and Refashioning al Andalus traces the evolving memory of a dominant al Andalus in medieval Castilian and later modern Spanish literature and its overlap with contemporary formations of collective identity race and nation It presents a series of close readings of neomedievalist literary works that look back to the socioeconomic apogee of al Andalus the tenth century Umayyad Caliphate of Cordoba from the thirteenth to the

nineteenth century These works rewrite what has become known as the story of the siete infantes de Lara although it is their Andalusí half brother Mudarra who takes centre stage from the early modern period on In its earliest form it is a story of a weak conflictual county of Castile dependent socioeconomically and morally upon Andalusí intervention This book therefore traces how a story of Castilian weakness is repeatedly rewritten once the reverse colonial dynamic had taken hold and Castile had begun conquering al Andalus Memories of Colonisation asks why Mudarra and the infantes continue to reappear in medieval chronicles from the Estoria de España to lesser known regional historiography early modern ballads comedias and nineteenth century Romantic poetry and prose By examining how each of these texts remember tenth century Iberia's fluid geographical and interracial boundaries it explores how they support or challenge dominant contemporary discourses of collective identity race and nation from the neogothic aspirations of thirteenth century Castile to the antisemitism of fifteenth century Toledo expansion in the Mediterranean the Islamophobia of the morisco expulsion and the partisan manipulation of al Andalus under nineteenth century liberalism As the first study of the development of Spanish neomedievalism it explores how this serves as a productive prescient discourse of cultural memory through which chroniclers poets playwrights and authors can look forward It questions the inevitability of Christian Castilian colonial hegemony by invoking a narrative of Christian Iberia's own subjugation by a superior Umayyad Caliphate It also explores how each text exposes the task of reconstructing historical memory in the present and thereby challenges the notion of a stable incontestable past for Castile and Spain

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
