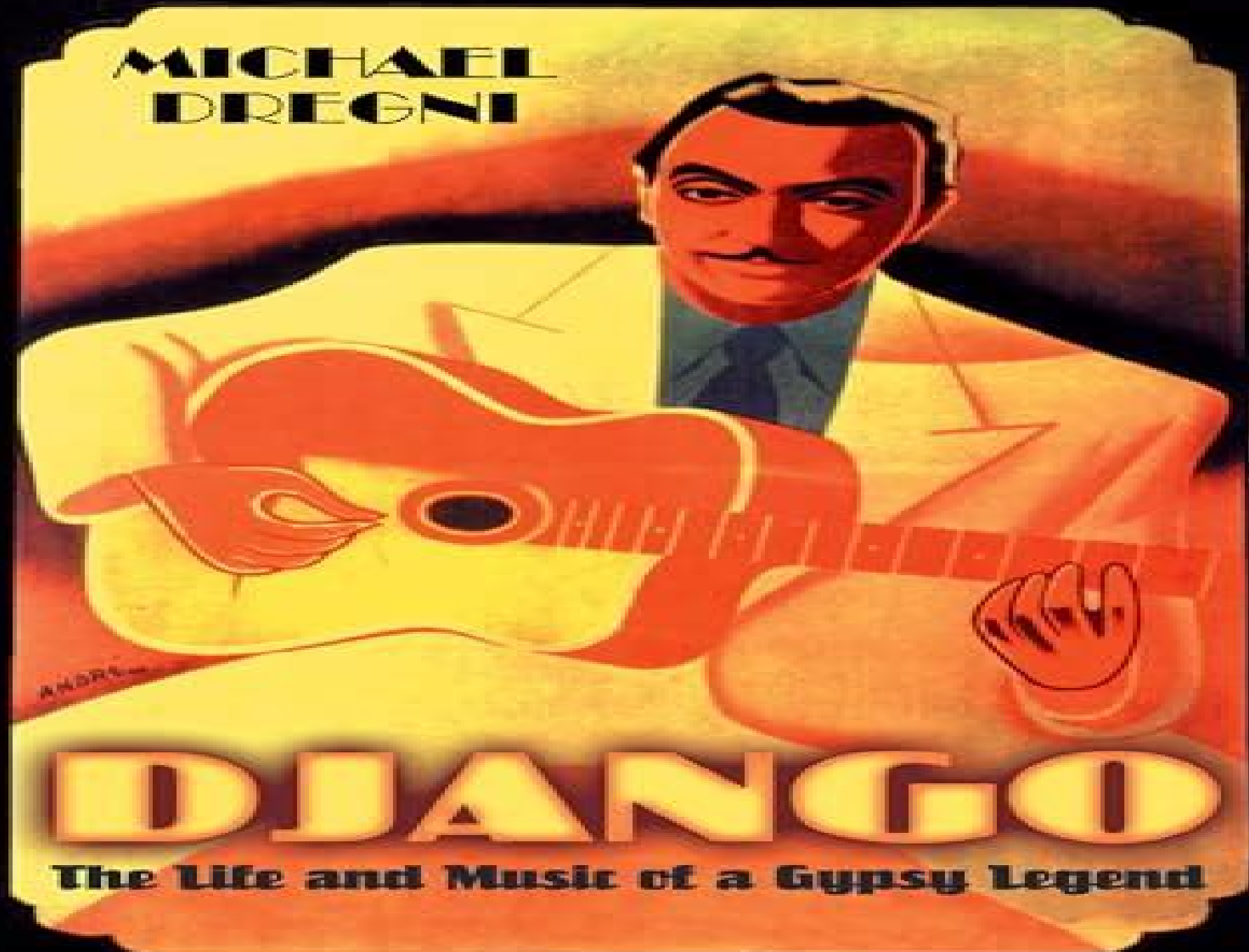

The Paris Zone James Cannon, 2016-02-24 Since the mid 1970s the colloquial term zone has often been associated with the troubled post-war housing estates on the outskirts of large French cities. However, it once referred to a more circumscribed space, the zone non aedificandi, non-building zone, which encircled Paris from the 1840s to the 1940s.
