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Moreover, our assessment also acknowledges the value and limitations of literature. It is not an alternative to the dependency on the primary sources. Thus, for example, the description by Jones and Williams in the *British culture of the 18th century* is illustrated by a number of quotations taken out of 18th-century literature (1997: 103). It is obvious to the reader, however, that the authors are not only aware of the sources but also aware of the problems of using them. In the same way, the authors of *18th-century Britain* have gathered quotations, both from primary and 19th-century English literature, which they often quote (1997). The authors have a very good knowledge of the sources and they also understand the value and the limitations of the sources. The quotation on the last page of the second volume, *Eighteenth-century Britain*, by the authors themselves, is a testimony to this knowledge:
