Edward Chamberlin, 2010-05-28 We need to understand our stories because our lives depend upon it Ted Chamberlin The stories we tell each other reflect and shape our deepest feelings Stories help us live our lives and are at the heart of our current conflicts We love and hate because of them we make homes for ourselves and drive others out on the basis of ancient tales As Ted Chamberlin vividly reveals we are both connected by them and separated by their different truths Whether Jew or Arab black or white Muslim or Christian Catholic or Protestant man or woman our stories hold us in thrall and hold others at bay Like the work of Joseph Campbell and Bruce Chatwin this vital engrossing book offers a new way to understand the hold that stories and songs have on us and a new sense of the urgency of doing so Drawing on his own experience in many fields as scholar and storyteller witness among native peoples and across cultures Ted Chamberlin takes us on a journey through the tales of different peoples from North America to Africa and Jamaica Beautifully written with insight and deep understanding If This Is Your Land Where Are Your Stories examines why it is now more important than ever to attend to what others are saying in their stories and myths and what we are saying about ourselves Only then will we understand why Our Fire Survives the Storm Daniel Heath Justice, 2006 Once the most powerful indigenous they have such power over us nation in the southeastern United States the Cherokees survive and thrive as a people nearly two centuries after the Trail of Tears and a hundred years after the allotment of Indian Territory In Our Fire Survives the Storm Daniel Heath Justice traces the expression of Cherokee identity in that nation's literary tradition Through cycles of war and peace resistance and assimilation trauma and regeneration Cherokees have long debated what it means to be Cherokee through protest writings memoirs fiction and retellings of traditional stories Justice employs the Chickamauga consciousness of resistance and Beloved Path of engagement theoretical approaches that have emerged out of Cherokee social history to interpret diverse texts composed in English a language embraced by many as a tool of both access and defiance Justice's analysis ultimately locates the Cherokees as a people of many perspectives many bloods mingled into a collective sense of nationhood Just as the oral traditions of the Cherokee people reflect the living realities and concerns of those who share them Justice concludes so too is their literary tradition a textual testament to Cherokee endurance and vitality Daniel Heath Justice is assistant professor of aboriginal literatures at the University of Toronto With Good Intentions Celia Haig-Brown, David A. Nock, 2011-11-01 With Good Intentions examines the joint efforts of Aboriginal people and individuals of European ancestry to counter injustice in Canada when colonization was at its height from the mid nineteenth to the early twentieth century These people recognized colonial wrongs and worked together in a variety of ways to right them but they could not stem the

tide of European based exploitation The book is neither an apologist text nor an attempt to argue that some colonizers were simply well intentioned Almost all those considered here teachers lawyers missionaries activists had as their overall goal the Christianization and civilization of Canada's First Peoples While their sensitivity and willingness to work in concert with Aboriginal people made them stand out from their less sympathetic compatriots they were nonetheless implicated in the colonialist project as the contributors to this volume make clear By discussing examples of Euro Canadians who worked with Aboriginal peoples With Good Intentions brings to light some of the lesser known complexities of colonization This volume is an important resource for anyone interested in Canadian history particularly post Confederation history and in Native studies and issues of colonization of Native peoples **Decolonizing Philosophies of Education** Ali A. identifiable Mennonite literary writer in the country Beginning in the 1970s the numbers grew rapidly and now include writers Patrick Friesen Sandra Birdsell Di Brandt Sarah Klassen Armin Wiebe David Bergen Miriam Toews Carrie Snyder Casey Plett and many more A similar renaissance is evident in the visual arts including artists Gathie Falk Wanda Koop and Aganetha Dyck and in music including composers Randolph Peters Carol Ann Weaver and Stephanie Martin Confronted with an embarrassment of riches that resist survey Magdalene Redekop opts for the use of case studies to raise questions about Mennonites and art Part criticism part memoir Making Believe argues that there is no such thing as Mennonite art At the same time her close engagement with individual works of art paradoxically leads Redekop to identify a Mennonite sensibility at play in the space where artists from many cultures interact Constant questioning and commitment to community are part of the Mennonite dissenting tradition Although these values come up against the legacy of radical Anabaptist hostility to art Redekop argues that the Early Modern roots of a contemporary crisis of representation are shared by all artists Making Believe posits a Spielraum or play space in which all artists are dissembling tricksters but differences in how we play are inflected by where we come from The close readings in this book insist on respect for difference at the same time as they invite readers to find common ground while making believe across cultures First Person Plural Sophie McCall,2011-05-15 In this innovative exploration told to narratives or collaboratively produced texts by Aboriginal storytellers and usually non Aboriginal writers are not romanticized as unmediated translations of oral documents nor are they dismissed as corruptions of original works Rather the approach emphasizes the interpenetration of authorship and collaboration Focused on the 1990s when debates over voice and representation were particularly explosive this comprehensive study examines a range of told to narratives ethnography life narrative documentary in conjunction with key political events that have shaped the struggle for Aboriginal rights in Canada Emphasizing the scope rather than the limits of the told to narrative McCall considers how Aboriginal voices have been represented in a variety of forums such as public inquiries commissioners reports and land claims cases A captivating inquiry First Person Plural offers a vital interdisciplinary discussion of how told to narratives contribute to larger debates about Indigenous voice and literary and political sovereignty
