

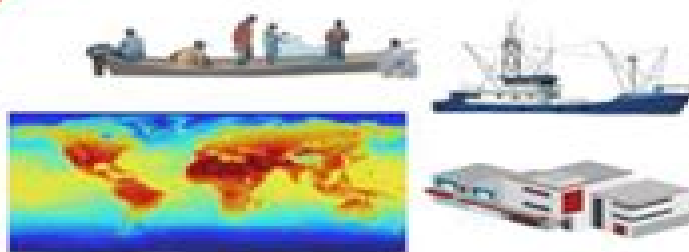
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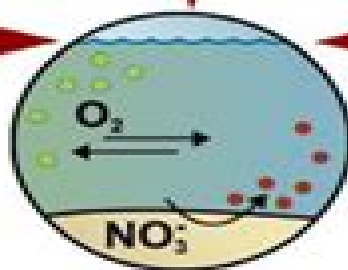


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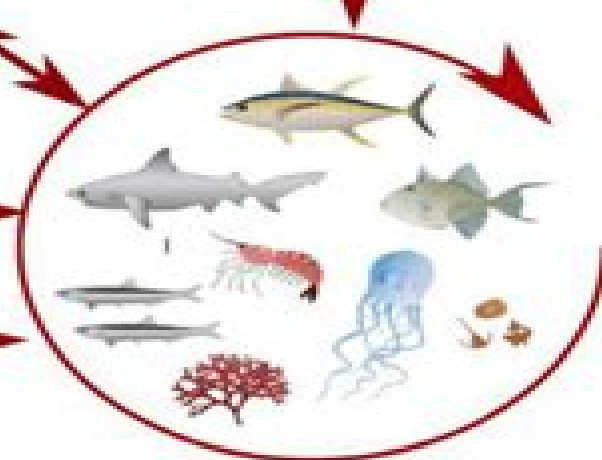

Ainsworth, Michael Jerome Schirripa, Hem Nalini Morzaria-Luna, 2015 The Gulf of Mexico supports a high biological diversity and biomass of fish seabirds and mammals in this region multiple commercial and recreational fishing fleets operate providing economic resources for local populations The Gulf is also the site of important oil and gas production and tourism As a result of intensive human use the Gulf is subject to various impacts including oil spills habitat degradation and anoxia Management of this Large Marine Ecosystem requires an ecosystem based management approach that provides a holistic approach to resource management The Gulf of Mexico is managed as part of NOAA s Integrated Ecosystem Assessment Program IEA This program considers the development of ecosystem models as a tool for ecosystem based fisheries management EBFM and to support the different stages in the IEA process particularly testing the effects of alternative management scenarios As part of this program we have parametrized an Atlantis ecosystem model for the Gulf of Mexico including major functional groups physiographic dynamics and fishing fleets The Gulf of Mexico GOM Atlantis model represents a collaboration between the University of South Florida the University of Miami the Southeast Fisheries Science Center the National Coastal Data Development Center and other contributors Executive summary Using Ecological Models to Support and Shape Environmental Policy Decisions Chiara Piroddi, Diego Macias, Marilaure Gregoire, Johanna Jacomina Heymans, Howard Townsend, 2022-02-10 *Effective Monitoring to Evaluate Ecological Restoration in the Gulf of Mexico* National Academies of Sciences, Engineering, and Medicine, Division on Earth and Life Studies, Water Science and Technology Board, Ocean Studies Board, Committee on Effective Approaches for Monitoring and Assessing Gulf of Mexico Restoration Activities, 2017-03-16 Gulf Coast communities and natural resources suffered extensive direct and indirect damage as a result of the largest accidental oil spill in US history referred to as the Deepwater Horizon DWH oil spill Notably natural resources affected by this major spill include wetlands coastal beaches and barrier islands coastal and marine wildlife seagrass beds oyster reefs commercial fisheries deep benthos and coral reefs among other habitats and species Losses include an estimated 20% reduction in commercial fishery landings across the Gulf of Mexico and damage to as much as 1 100 linear miles of coastal salt marsh wetlands This historic spill is being followed by a restoration effort unparalleled in complexity and magnitude in U S history Legal settlements in the wake of DWH led to the establishment of a set of programs tasked with administering and supporting DWH related restoration in the Gulf of Mexico In order to ensure that restoration goals are met and money is well spent restoration monitoring and evaluation should be an integral part of those programs However evaluations of past restoration efforts have shown that monitoring is often inadequate or even absent *Effective Monitoring to Evaluate Ecological Restoration in the Gulf of Mexico* identifies best practices for monitoring and evaluating restoration activities to improve the performance of restoration programs and increase the effectiveness and longevity of

restoration projects This report provides general guidance for restoration monitoring assessment and synthesis that can be applied to most ecological restoration supported by these major programs given their similarities in restoration goals It also offers specific guidance for a subset of habitats and taxa to be restored in the Gulf including oyster reefs tidal wetlands and seagrass habitats as well as a variety of birds sea turtles and marine mammals

Fishery independent surveys provide crucial information for monitoring and assessing marine fish stocks Their utility can largely be attributed to sampling procedures that are consistent across space and time such that observed dynamics can reasonably be assumed to reflect those of the population or community being studied However sometimes changes to the survey design become desirable or necessary They may be desirable if the benefits of modification outweigh the benefits of consistency for example with improvements in sampling technology or efficiency revised survey priorities or increased funding that allows for greater spatial coverage or temporal resolution In other cases changes to the survey design may not be desirable but necessary for example when specific supplies or equipment become unobtainable or with reductions in funding ship time or human resources

Hetland, Katja Fennel, 2017-05-03 This book provides a snapshot of representative modeling analyses of coastal hypoxia and its effects Hypoxia refers to conditions in the water column where dissolved oxygen falls below levels that can support most metazoan marine life i e 2 mg O₂ l⁻¹ The number of hypoxic zones has been increasing at an exponential rate since the 1960s there are currently more than 600 documented hypoxic zones in the estuarine and coastal waters worldwide Hypoxia develops as a synergistic product of many physical and biological factors that affect the balance of dissolved oxygen in seawater including temperature solar radiation wind freshwater discharge nutrient supply and the production and decay of organic matter A number of modeling approaches have been increasingly used in hypoxia research along with the more traditional observational and experimental studies Modeling is necessary because of rapidly changing coastal circulation and stratification patterns that affect hypoxia the large spatial extent over which hypoxia develops and limitations on our capabilities to directly measure hypoxia over large spatial and temporal scales This book consists of 15 chapters that are broadly organized around three main topics 1 Modeling of the physical controls on hypoxia 2 Modeling of biogeochemical controls and feedbacks and 3 Modeling of the ecological effects of hypoxia The final chapter is a synthesis chapter that draws generalities from the earlier chapters highlights strengths and weaknesses of the current state of the art modeling and offers recommendations on future directions
