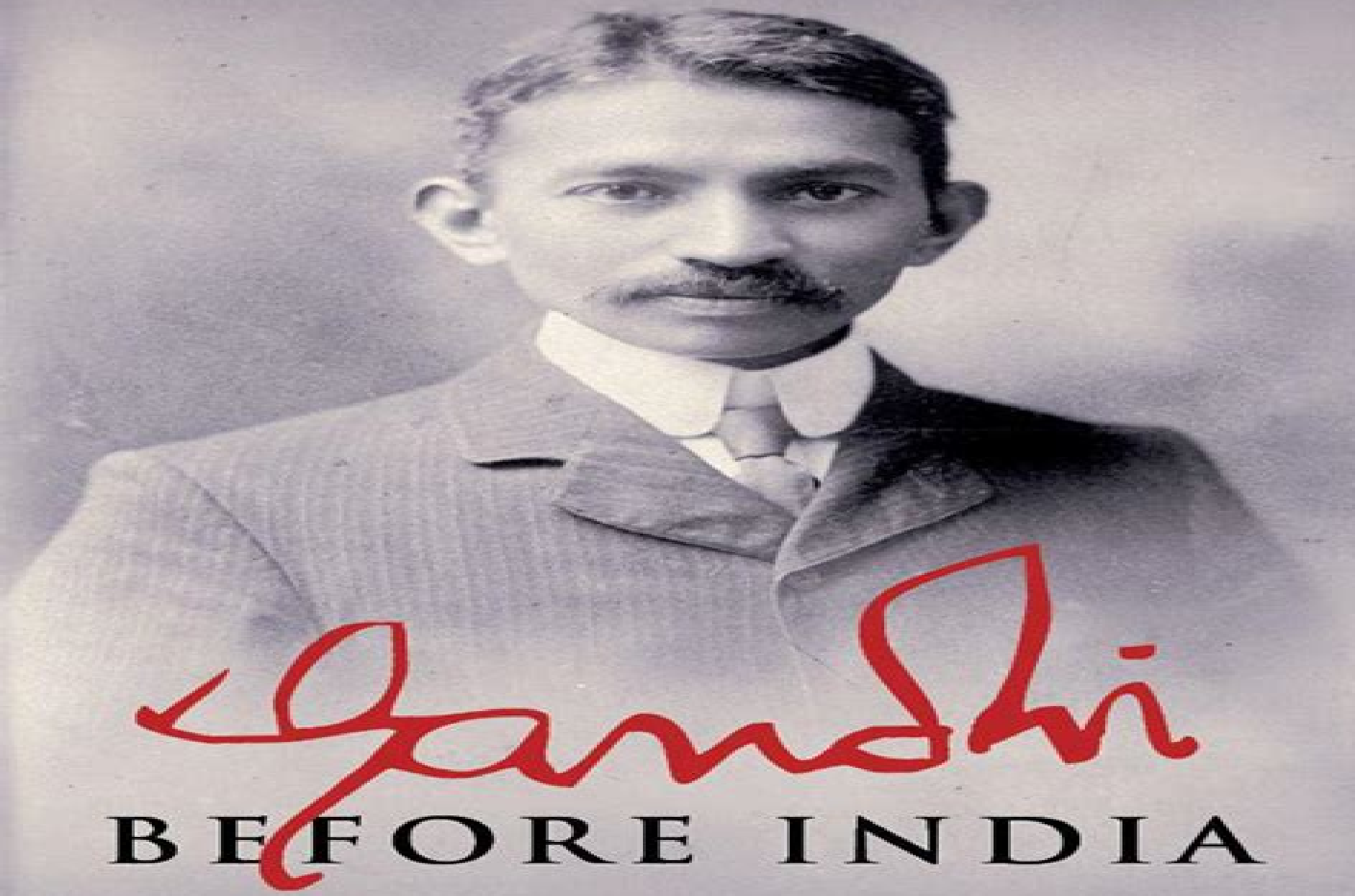

the problem of democratization under the most inhospitable conditions On January 26 1950 the Indian Constitution the longest in the world came into effect More than half of the world's constitutions have been written in the past three decades Unlike the constitutional revolutions of the late eighteenth century these contemporary revolutions have occurred in countries characterized by low levels of economic growth and education where voting populations are deeply divided by race religion and ethnicity And these countries have democratized at once not gradually The events and ideas of India's Founding Moment offer a natural reference point for these nations where democracy and constitutionalism have arrived simultaneously and they remind us of the promise and challenge of self rule today
