This handbook provides broad coverage of the languages indigenous to North America with special focus on typologically interesting features and areal characteristics surveys of current work and topics of particular importance to communities The volume is divided into two major parts subfields of linguistics and family sketches The subfields include those that are customarily addressed in discussions of North American languages sounds and sound structure words sentences as well as many that have received somewhat less attention until recently tone prosody sociolinguistic variation directives information structure discourse meaning language over space and time conversation structure evidentiality pragmatics verbal art first and second language acquisition archives evolving notions of fieldwork Family sketches cover major language families and isolates and highlight topics of special value to communities engaged in work on language maintenance documentation and revitalization

The Polysynthesis Parameter Mark C. Baker, 1996-01-04 This book investigates in detail the grammar of polysynthetic languages those with very complex verbal morphology Baker argues that polysynthesis is more than an accidental collection of morphological processes rather it is a systematic way of representing predicate argument relationships that is parallel to but distinct from the system used in languages like English Having repercussions for many areas of syntax and related aspects of morphology and semantics this argument results in a comprehensive picture of the grammar of polysynthetic languages Baker draws on examples from Mohawk and certain languages of the American Southwest Mesoamerica Australia and Siberia

Explaining Language Structure Through Systems Interaction Zygmunt Frajzyngier, Erin Shay, 2003-01-01 This book proposes a framework for describing languages through the description of relationships among lexicon morphology syntax and phonology The framework is based on the notion of formal coding means the principle of functional transparency the notion of functional domains and the notion of systems interaction in the coding of functional domains The study is based on original analyses of cross linguistic data The fundamental finding of the study is that different languages may code different functional domains which must be discovered by analyzing the formal means available in each language The first part of the book proposes a methodology for discovering functional domains and the second part describes the properties of various functional domains The book presents new cross linguistic analyses of theoretical issues including agreement phenomena attributed to government nominal classification prerequisites for and implications of linear order coding and defining characteristics of lexical categories The study also contributes new analyses of specific problems in individual languages

The World Atlas of Language Structures Martin Haspelmath, 2005-07-21 The World Atlas of Language Structures is a book and CD combination displaying the structural properties of the world's languages 142 world maps and numerous regional maps all in colour display the geographical distribution of features of pronunciation and grammar such as number of vowels tone systems gender plurals tense word order and body part

terminology Each world map shows an average of 400 languages and is accompanied by a fully referenced description of the structural feature in question The CD provides an interactive electronic version of the database which allows the reader to zoom in on or customize the maps to display bibliographical sources and to establish correlations between features The book and the CD together provide an indispensable source of information for linguists and others seeking to understand human languages The Atlas will be especially valuable for linguistic typologists grammatical theorists historical and comparative linguists and for those studying a region such as Africa Southeast Asia North America Australia and Europe It will also interest anthropologists and geographers More than fifty authors from many different countries have collaborated to produce a work that sets new standards in comparative linguistics No institution involved in language research can afford to be without it

The Oxford Handbook of Polysynthesis Michael Fortescue, Marianne Mithun, Nicholas Evans, 2017-09-14 This handbook offers an extensive crosslinguistic and cross theoretical survey of polysynthetic languages in which single multi morpheme verb forms can express what would be whole sentences in English These languages and the problems they raise for linguistic analyses have long featured prominently in language descriptions and yet the essence of polysynthesis remains under discussion right down to whether it delineates a distinct coherent type rather than an assortment of frequently co occurring traits Chapters in the first part of the handbook relate polysynthesis to other issues central to linguistics such as complexity the definition of the word the nature of the lexicon idiomaticity and to typological features such as argument structure and head marking Part two contains areal studies of those geographical regions of the world where polysynthesis is particularly common such as the Arctic and Sub Arctic and northern Australia The third part examines diachronic topics such as language contact and language obsolescence while part four looks at acquisition issues in different polysynthetic languages Finally part five contains detailed grammatical descriptions of over twenty languages which have been characterized as polysynthetic with special attention given to the presence or absence of potentially criterial features

Aspects of Argument Structure Acquisition in Inuktitut Shanley Allen, 1996-01-01 This book discusses the first language acquisition of three morphosyntactic mechanisms of transitivity alternation in arctic Quebec Inuktitut Data derive from naturalistic longitudinal spontaneous speech samples collected over a nine month period from four Inuit children Both basic and advanced forms of passive structures are shown to be used productively by Inuktitut speaking children at an early age relative to English speaking children but consistent in age with speakers of non Indo European languages reported on in the literature potential explanations of this difference include frequency of caregiver input and details of language structure Morphological causatives appear slightly later in the acquisition sequence and their first instances reflect use of unanalyzed routines Lexical causatives are present from the earliest ages studied Evidence of a period of overgeneralization of lexical causatives in one subject at the same time as the morphological causative shows signs of being productively acquired suggests that the seeming overgeneralization may reflect nothing more than as yet unstable use of the morphological causative Noun incorporation structures are shown to be used productively by Inuktitut speaking children at an early age relative to Mohawk speaking children potential explanations of this difference include details of language structure and relative language use in the environments of the learners Findings are considered in light of current debates in the literature concerning continuity versus maturation of grammatical structure

and concerning the functional categories available to the child at early stages of acquisition Data presented argue against late maturation and suggest that all functional categories may be accessed by the Inuktitut speaking child early in the acquisition process

Argument Structure and Syntactic Relations Maia Duguine, Susana Huidobro, Nerea Madariaga, 2010 The topic of this collection is argument structure The fourteen chapters in this book are divided into four parts Semantic and Syntactic Properties of Event Structure A Cartographic View on Argument Structure Syntactic Heads Involved in Argument Structure and Argument Structure in Language Acquisition Rigorous theoretical analyses are combined with empirical work on specific aspects of argument structure The book brings together authors working in different linguistic fields semantics syntax and language acquisition who explore new findings as well as more established data but then from new theoretical perspectives The contributions propose cartographic views of argument structure as opposed to minimalistic proposals of a binary template model for argument structure in order to optimally account for various syntactic and semantic facts as well as data derived from wider cross linguistic perspectives Argument structure plays a central role in the articulation of syntax Yet whether this contribution is primordial or derivative derivational or representational minimalist or cartographic is entirely up for grabs This is what makes a book like the present one equivalent to a murder thriller one cannot finish one chapter without wanting to read the next While the solution to the underlying mystery remains as open as it ever was the clues offered here seem just impossible to ignore

Long-Distance Dependencies Mihoko Zushi, 2013-10-31 This book investigates the theory of locality within the framework of minimalism with a special focus on restructuring and other related phenomena that exhibit an apparent violation of the strictly local conditions

A History of the Study of the Indigenous Languages of North America Marcin Kilarski, 2021-12-06 The languages indigenous to North America are characterized by a remarkable genetic and typological diversity Based on the premise that linguistic examples play a key role in the origin and transmission of ideas within linguistics and across disciplines this book examines the history of approaches to these languages through the lens of some of their most prominent properties These properties include consonant inventories and the near absence of labials in Iroquoian languages gender in Algonquian languages verbs for washing in the Iroquoian language Cherokee and terms for snow and related phenomena in Eskimo Aleut languages By tracing the interpretations of the four examples by European and American scholars the author illustrates their role in both lay and professional contexts as a window onto unfamiliar languages and cultures thus allowing a more holistic view of the history of language study in North America

Unique Focus Marina Stoyanova, 2008-04-10 This monograph focuses on an interesting typological property shared by four languages the ungrammaticality of multiple wh questions in Irish Berber Italian and Somali It contains a broad discussion of data related to the grammar of wh questions a comparative analysis of wh constructions in the four languages and a theoretical account for the observed phenomenon The analysis is based on the minimalist syntax theory as developed by Chomsky since 1995 It takes up the standard assumption that wh phrases are typical representatives of elements bearing new information in theoretical terms referred to as information focus Most importantly in the languages without multiple wh questions the information focus is licensed in a unique syntactic position The basic claim is that languages with unique focus are languages without multiple wh questions The analysis makes possible the classification of the languages without multiple wh questions into the crosslinguistic typology of wh constructions Furthermore this book is a contribution to the better understanding of information structure in natural languages especially of focusing phenomena

Word Prominence in Languages with Complex Morphologies Ksenia Bogomolets, Harry van der Hulst, 2023 This book focuses on the theoretical and analytical challenges that languages with complex morphologies pose for the theory and typology of word level prosodic phenomena The first three chapters explore general theoretical issues while later chapters offer a series of case studies from a range of genetically and geographically diverse languages

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
