The Anatomy of the Zulu Army Ian Knight, 2015-11-30 An in depth look at the army of Africa s Zulu kingdom leading up to their epic battle against the British army in 1879 Forces of the independent Zulu kingdom inflicted a crushing defeat on British imperial forces at Isandlwana in January 1879 The Zulu Army was not however a professional force unlike its British counterpart but was the mobilized manpower of the Zulu state Ian Knight details how the Zulu army functioned and ties its role firmly to the broader context of Zulu society and culture The Zulu army had its roots in the early groups of young men who took part in combat between tribes but such warfare was limited to disputes over cattle ownership grazing rights or avenging insults In the early nineteenth century the Zulu nation began a period of rapid expansion and King Shaka began to reform his forces into regular military units Ian Knight charts the development and training of the men that formed
