gender issues and religious conflict the book goes beyond the declared ideology of each writer to get at covert significations pointing to widely shared but often unacknowledged biases The book is deeply analytical but lucid and jargon free and to those unfamiliar with the writers it introduces a new keenness into Indian literary criticism to make its objects exciting
