pragmatic pluralism is set up as a response to particular conditions and consequences so it gains practical leverage with complex ethical political educational and policy problems without flattening variability among values or presuming that abstract theories can determine what we ought to do He argues that the reductive monistic premise that logically underlies moral fundamentalism is both unwarranted and constrictive and there is little to be said in favor of the grand philosophical quest for a unifying principle that cannot be accommodated within a wider pluralistic approach In a concrete and engaging style Fesmire clarifies and illustrates the promises and challenges of democratic decision making in societies struggling to grow beyond moral fundamentalism
